

ED and Diabetes

Over time, it's very common for people with diabetes to experience nerve damage due to high blood sugar levels.

Diabetic nerve damage can lead to loss of sensation or feeling in the feet or hands. It can also cause problems with digestion, going to the bathroom or having sex.^{1,2}

If you're a man with diabetes experiencing ED – the inability to get or maintain an erection that's firm enough or lasts long enough to have successful sexual intercourse – you're not alone. Men with diabetes are three times more likely to experience ED than men without diabetes, and it affects them 10–15 years earlier in life.¹

Discover Hope

Fortunately, there are many ways to treat ED today. Oral medications are a common first step, but they don't work for everyone – especially those with diabetes: PDE5 inhibitors (the type of medications that include Viagra™, Cialis™ and Levitra™) are shown to be less effective in men with diabetes.¹ Men with diabetes and ED are more likely to be prescribed treatment beyond medications.³

Men with diabetes are 1.5 to 2 times more likely to proceed with **more advanced treatments for ED** than those without diabetes.³

Know All Your Options

The important thing to know is that you are not alone – there is hope for nearly every man suffering from ED. Treatment options include oral medications, vacuum devices, suppositories, injections and penile implants. These treatments work differently for different people, and some may be more effective than others for you.

A penile implant is a unique solution because it allows you to have intimacy wherever, whenever and for as long as you want. It lets you be spontaneous again, and is reliable with no medication side effects or ongoing cost.

Many patients and partners are highly satisfied with the penile implant. Penile implants have been in clinical use for over 40 years⁵ and over 400,000 patients have been treated with an AMS penile implant.⁶



92% of patients and 96% of their partners reported sexual activity with the implant to be **excellent or satisfactory**.⁴

Could a Penile Implant Be the Answer for You?

A penile implant is entirely contained within the body and is designed to be simple and easy to operate. It provides the ability to have an erection anytime you choose, and once activated, you can maintain an erection as long as you desire. It typically does not interfere with ejaculation or orgasm.^{4,7}



- **Talk with a urologist who specializes in ED** and offers the full range of treatment options, including implants.

Your doctor is your best source for information on the risks and benefits of the Inflatable Penile Prosthesis. Talk to your doctor for a complete listing of risks, warnings and important safety information. The AMS Inflatable Penile Prosthesis is intended for use in the treatment of male erectile dysfunction (impotence). Implanting a penile prosthesis will damage or destroy any remaining ability to have a natural erection, as well as make other treatment options impossible. Men with diabetes, spinal cord injuries or skin infections may have an increased risk of infection. Implantation may

result in penile shortening, curvature or scarring. Some AMS devices contain an antibiotic (InhibiZone™ Antibiotic Surface Treatment). The device may not be suited for patients who are allergic to the antibiotics contained within the device (rifampin, minocycline or other tetracyclines) or have systemic lupus. Potential risks may include: device malfunction/failure leading to additional surgery, device migration potentially leading to exposure through the tissue, wearing away/loss of tissue (device/tissue erosion) infection, unintended-inflation of the device and pain/soreness.
